



## WHAT IS THE NATIONAL BUILDING RECONCILIATION FORUM?

Since 2015, Canadian universities, supported by Universities Canada, have organized an annual forum bringing together "leaders from universities, colleges, and Indigenous communities to create **meaningful and lasting institutional change in the higher education sector to advance reconciliation**" (Universities Canada, 2017).

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### WHY IS THIS EVENT IMPORTANT?

In 2015, the **Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC)** submitted its inquiry report highlighting the violence and trauma experienced by Canadian Indigenous children forcibly placed in residential schools.

The disastrous consequences of that assimilation process orchestrated by the Canadian government are still being felt many years after the institutions closed.

The TRC's report includes a call to "transform Canadian society so that our children and grandchildren can live together in dignity, peace, and prosperity on these lands we now share."

The commissioners further assert their belief that education is also "the key to reconciliation."



### WHY IS THIS EVENT IMPORTANT? (CONT.)

In a call for reconciliation and the establishment of a new balance of power, the **Public Inquiry Commission on relations between Indigenous Peoples** (Viens) and certain government services in Quebec proposes cross-cutting measures like *mimproving living conditions, breaking down language barriers to access services, providing support and guidance to First Nations and Inuit in their relations with government services, and providing training and information for both citizens and professionals.* 

The final report of the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls presents a series of calls for justice. Many of these relate to education, including call 11.1:

"We call upon all elementary, secondary, and post-secondary institutions and education authorities to educate and provide awareness to the public about missing and murdered Indigenous women, girls, and 2SLGBTQQIA people, and about the issues and root causes of violence they experience."

#### WHAT WILL BE THE THEME OF THE FORUM?

Falling into step with First Peoples students to...

- Show respect for the realities of First Nations and Inuit people regarding education in Québec (e.g., language, culture, history, pride in their identity, etc.).
- Support the multiple paths and trajectories of First Peoples students.
- Recognize the systemic barriers and challenges associated with each of the different levels of education.
- ✓ Identify potential mechanisms to overcome these barriers, determine the roles of different actors (governments, educational institutions, services, etc.), and obtain concrete commitments from these actors to support and guide First Peoples students throughout their education.

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#### WHAT ARE THE GOALS OF THE FORUM?

- Developed in a collaborative process, the 2021 National Building Reconciliation Forum seeks to rally and bring together the main actors in the world of Indigenous education and all post-secondary institutions in Quebec and across Canada
- ✓ It will serve as a springboard to ensure that the ideas discussed at the forum come to fruition, and that they help support Indigenous people in the process of taking charge of education by and for First Peoples, and transforming Québec and Canadian society.
- Our hope is that this event will mark a commitment by the actors involved to take concrete action aimed at overcoming systemic barriers to the success of First Peoples students.
